 72% of voters think it is very or somewhat likely that childcare will become harder to afford in their local area next year

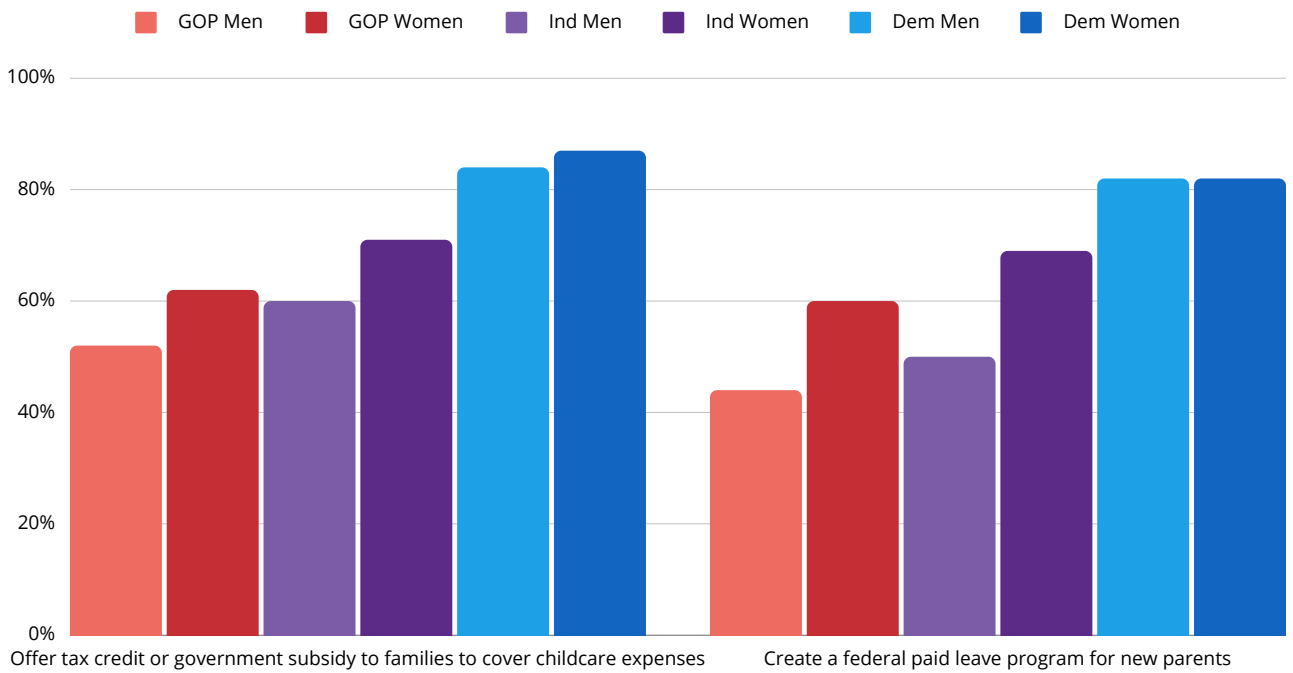


Chart showing support for federal paid leave and childcare programs by gender and party affiliation

When it comes to women of color, 81% of black women* and 75% of Hispanic women support a federal paid leave program.

Survey Details

All In Together's May 2023 National Survey was conducted in partnership with Echelon Insights. This survey looked at 856 registered voters in the Likely Electorate nationwide from May 8-10, 2023, with a 3.4 margin of error. The survey also oversampled 421 women with a 4.1 margin of error for a total of 1277 respondents surveyed. The survey was conducted online using a non probability sample.
